

# By What Name?

(Acts 4:1-22)

## Introduction

- 1. Accelerate: Jesus accelerates us by the power of the Holy Spirit to a transformative, relational, missional life in Christ.
- 2. How do people respond when we see the work of God around us?
  - a. Sometimes we fear He will do something we don't want or ask for.
  - b. We can learn to be genuinely thankful for His work, regardless of the circumstances.
- 3. Background: [Acts 3:1-26] Peter & John heal a crippled man by Jesus' name to point people to Him in repentance.

### People want to be in control [Acts 4:1-7]

- 1. [1-4] The ruling elite get annoyed
  - a. [1] People who run the Temple: Priests, captain of the guard (#2 after the High Priest), Sadducees.
    - i. Sadducees: Another sect of Judaism (like Pharisees).
      - ii. Privileged aristocracy: They are rich & powerful
        - 1. The High Priest comes from their line, as they claim roots back to the High Priest Zadok (1 Kgs 2:35); hence 'Zadok'-sees ("righteous ones").
        - 2. They work with the Roman government to protect their economic & political interests.
        - 3. Most Jews despise them.
      - iii. Theology:
        - 1. Most only accept the Pentateuch as Scriptures.
        - 2. They believe the spirit dies with the physical body, leading to a materialistic outlook on life.
  - b. [2] They're annoyed by John & Peter's follow-up teaching about eternal life & resurrection through Jesus.
  - c. [3] They arrest Peter & John, imprisoning them overnight for the Sanhedrin (supreme court) in the morning.
  - d. [4] They're annoyed because 5000 men (not counting women & children) now follow Jesus as a result of the miraculous healing & teaching about Jesus.
- 2. [5-7] The Supreme Court questions the disciples' authority.
  - a. [5] The Sanhedrin (civic/religious leaders) convene
    - i. [6] This includes Sadducees like the High Priest emeritus (Annas), his son-in-law & current high priest (Caiaphas), & other members of the high priestly family.
    - ii. Sanhedrin met in Hall of Hewn Stones (building in the North wall of the Temple Mount)
      - 1. They walked by this man at the Temple gate every day, but are oblivious to the hurt/needy.
      - 2. Jesus' followers help this man; they never prayed for him, helped him, did anything
    - iii. Point: They are all alarmed; they are all part of the wealthy, powerful ruling elite in Israel.
    - b. [7] They inquire: "By what power/name did you do this?"
      - i. They don't ask because they're curious or really want to know.
      - ii. Their question implies: "It wasn't us; the teaching is not ours; we didn't give you permission to act. Whose authority gave you the right do this? We're in charge/control."
      - iii. They are more concerned about their standing, position, authority & control (themselves), then about a miracle (the healed man / God's work).
- 3. Underlying issue: Because of sin/selfishness, people want to be in control/authority.
  - a. To be lord over our own lives, others, & our circumstances
  - b. We fear losing what we have here (in this life).
- 4. <u>Application</u>: What do you hold in such high value in this life that you grab/control because you're afraid to lose it?
  - a. Even if Jesus says it's not good for you, and were to take it away?

## Disciples give Jesus credit [Acts 4:8-12]

- 1. [8-11] Disciples give Jesus credit for His work in them & through them.
  - a. [8] Peter is filled with the Holy Spirit to address the ruling, privileged aristocracy.
    - i. "Filled with the Holy Spirit": To say 'yes' to God & invite God's will be done in him & through him.
    - ii. Jesus fills him with words & wisdom to speak to the Sanhedrin (cf. Luke 21:12-15).
  - b. [9-10a] This miraculous authority & power to heal are from Jesus.
    - i. "By the name of Jesus": Not magic words, but by Jesus' power & authority, it was done.
  - c. [10b-11] They are opposite teams with God: They killed Him but God raised Him.
    - i. They are guilty of crucifying/rejecting Jesus as King, Savior, Lord, God (cf. Acts 2:36; 3:15)
- 2. [12] Disciples give Jesus credit for being the source of salvation
  - a. This miracle is proof of Jesus' power & authority to give salvation.
  - b. He alone has power & authority to move us from sin/death to resurrection/eternal life (cf. John 14:6).
  - c. Jesus doesn't just bring help/comfort for this life, but also guarantees a future/hope in the next (for eternity).
- 3. <u>Application</u>: As we give thanks this holiday season, we must give Jesus the credit He is due.
  - a. Do you give credit to Jesus for His miraculous work (in us & through us)?
  - b. Do you give Jesus credit as the only means of salvation?
  - c. Do you give Jesus credit, even in the face of opposition (like Peter & John)?

#### Who is in authority? [Acts 4:13-18]

- 1. [13-16] The Sanhedrin & Sadducees are at a crossroad.
  - a. [13] They see fearless confidence in Christ by uneducated/common men
    - i. They know the words/wisdom are not their own, but the influence of their Master, Jesus.
  - b. [14] They can't deny Jesus' authority/power to heal/save because the healed man is standing right there.
    - i. By the authority & power of Jesus, this man is healed, salvation has come.
      - ii. It is an authority & power greater than their own (as the Sanhedrin).
  - c. [15-16] They're at a crossroad; which direction will they go in acknowledging Jesus' authority?
- 2. [17-18] The Sanhedrin & Sadducees choose poorly.
  - a. [17] Their sole concern: "Spread no further among the people... speak no more to anyone in this name."
  - b. We don't care what Jesus has done; stop telling us/people about Him (His work of healing/salvation). We don't want people to follow Him, be changed by Him. We're the leaders here, not Jesus.
  - c. Issue: They refuse to acknowledge Jesus' authority because it messes up their plans/control.
- 3. Implications: If Jesus' authority is greater than mine, then...
  - a. People don't have to do what I say; they have to listen to Jesus.
  - b. They don't have to treat me with deference because I'm wealthy/powerful; they have to revere/worship Jesus.
  - c. It's not my money, stuff, time, energy; Jesus gets to determine how I use/invest it.
  - I don't get to pick & choose which things I obey from His Word; it's all good & all from God.
    i. E.g., forgiving/loving enemies; His prescription for holy, healthy relationships;
  - e. He can bring all sorts of people & changes to church; it's His church & we follow His lead.
- 4. We love sin/selfishness, want control/authority.
  - a. We want to be lord over our own lives, others, circumstances; we fear losing what we have here.
  - b. But when Jesus comes & does a miraculous work, it upsets the status quo & interrupts our plans, control & authority over situations.
  - c. He doesn't do it because He's mad or mean; He doesn't just do the miraculous work in others, but ignore us.
  - d. He actually shakes up our status quo for our good (cf. Jer 29:11)
    - i. He moves us out of self-centeredness/selfishness.
    - ii. He frees us from working to maintain control or trying to be lord/god over our own circumstances.
    - iii. He gives us opportunity to trust His authority & goodness as true Lord.
- 5. <u>Application</u>: Who's in authority in your life?
  - a. By whose name are people/circumstances miraculously changed, healed & saved?
  - b. Who has authority to change the direction of your life or your status quo?
  - c. Surrender to Jesus as Lord; trust Jesus as good.
