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Dinner Parties & Discipleship

(Luke 14:7-24)

Introduction

- 1. [Series] Resonate: Tune into Jesus' frequency to experience the power of the gospel & impact the culture.
- 2. The religious people follow Jesus around to scrutinize & criticize, & invite Him to a dinner party.
 - a. Jesus teaches them Party Etiquette 101: Life lessons on how to live out the Kingdom at parties.

Humility or humiliation? [Luke 14:7-11]

- 1. [7] Jesus notices the invited Pharisees jockeying for the best seat in the house.
 - a. Triclinium: Dinner table, U-shaped low couches where people recline head-to-foot (cf John 13:23-25).
 - b. The central position is for the host; the next highest honors are the seats to the left & right of him.
- 2. [8-9] The proud will be humiliated.
 - a. People who are proud always push their way to the front.
 - b. Pride is evil/satanic: [Isa 14; Eze 28] In pride, Satan rebelled against God instead of trusting in Him.
 - c. [Augustine] "Pride is like a mother pregnant with all the other sins."
 - d. It is the underlying root of all sins: "God, I'm not going to trust You or go Your way; my way is better."
 - e. Satan, those who do evil, those who exalt self will experience humiliation in this life or the one to come.
- 3. [10-11] The humble will be exalted.
 - a. Humility: Having the right view of yourself before God (cf. Phil 2:3-11).
 - b. God's plan for us is humility. If we don't operate with humility, we'll experience humiliation.
- 4. Application: Whether at a party or in life, do you walk the path of humility or humiliation? Pride Test:
 - a. Need a lot of attention
 - b. Attitude of entitlement or gratitude
 - c. Get upset when people don't honor your achievements
 - d. Jealous or critical of others' success
 - e. Cut in line at the store, airport or freeway: Indicative of self-importance; others can wait
 - f. Always need to win (maybe even cheat)
 - g. Pattern of lying: Something makes me look unfavorable, so I lie
 - h. Lots of tension/conflict with others: There's always conflict between the proud; seldom between the humble
 - i. Have a hard time acknowledging when wrong: Don't confess, fight when caught, shift blame, change subject. Instead of saying: "I'm wrong", making an excuse: "Nobody's perfect"; "I'm only human."

Generosity or reciprocity? [Luke 14:12-14]

- 1. [12] Jesus confronts the inviting Pharisee.
 - a. It's easy to fill up the table with friends, family, the rich, i.e., people you like & people of influence.
 - b. Why do we do that? Because of the hope of something in return, the selfish motivation of reciprocity.
- 2. [13] Radical Kingdom generosity: Instead, invite those who can't pay you back, the outcasts, broke & broken.
 - a. Biblical hospitality: Welcoming/love for strangers (philoxenia).
 - b. Application: Be generous with both the menu & the guest list, including those who are not yet friends.
- 3. [14] In Heaven, God will reward His followers that reflect Christ's generosity toward those who cannot repay.
 - a. It's not being generous (or works-based merit) that gets you into Heaven.

- 4. Application: Do you live a lifestyle of generosity or reciprocity?
 - a. Do you bless people generously? Without any strings attached, or expectation of repayment?
 - b. Are you inviting, welcoming & inclusive of strangers & strange people outside your comfort zone?

Important or inconvenient? [Luke 14:15-21a]

- 1. [15-16] Jesus teaches a Pharisee that the Kingdom of Heaven is like the greatest banquet party ever.
 - a. God commands feasts/holidays in the Old Testament because He is a good, joyful, celebrating, living God.
 - b. Big idea: All of life (including parties & celebrations) are all a preview for Heaven, a foreshadowing of eternity.
 - c. Jesus tells them, not all of them will be going to His party in Heaven.
- 2. Jesus' party has a lot of "no-shows."
 - a. [17-18a] The Pharisees would recognize the excuses as ridiculous & insulting in Ancient Near East culture.
 - b. [18b] No one buys real estate without seeing it first.
 - c. [19] The wealthy landowner can afford to wait a few days to examine the many work oxen he's bought.
 - d. [20] It's not their wedding day, & his wife wouldn't dictate his schedule in ANE culture.
 - e. [21a] The Inviter is justly angry because his tremendous effort, expense & generosity are met with disdain.
 - f. Instead of honoring Him & enjoying His generosity as important, they saw it as inconvenient.
- 3. Application: How many of us are not moving toward the Kingdom because of lame excuses?
 - a. Life is filled with distractions & lame excuses; following Jesus is not a one-time decision.
 - b. Following Jesus is a lifetime pursuit, culminating in the Wedding Feast of the Lamb [Rev 19].
 - c. Is pursuing Jesus important or inconvenient to you?

Respond to the invitation [Luke 14:21b-24]

- 1. [21b-24] The celebration will go on & every seat filled, but by the most unlikely people.
 - a. Again, the outcast, broke & broken are invited (cf. 14:12-13).
 - b. But those originally invited who reject the invitation won't taste the banquet.
- 2. [Isa 25:6] What will the Kingdom banquet be like?
 - a. Menu: The richest, best, finest food with God as the chef.
 - b. Guest list: An invitation goes out to all peoples; anybody can come to Jesus & His party.
- 3. Challenge: Will you make it to the Kingdom party?
 - a. Have you turned from sin & trusted in Jesus?
 - b. He is the God who left a great Party, came down to be inconvenienced, humiliated, treated as unimportant & crucified to extend an invitation to come to His party by paying your debt of sin.
 - c. He's ascended back to Heaven & is preparing a generous place & feast for us (John 14:2).
- 4. Challenge: Throw a great party; show people the Kingdom.
 - a. Be generous with what you have (whether little or much).
 - b. Invite old friends, strangers and people in need.
