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Son of God

(Luke 3:15-22)

Introduction

[Series] Resonate: Tune into Jesus' frequency to amplify the gospel in your life & church, and to impact the culture.

1. Big Idea: When we understand Jesus' identity, it shapes our new identity in Him.

Jesus is greater than John [Luke 3:15-20]

- 1. [3:15-16a] The crowd's question: Are you the One we've been waiting for?
 - a. [16a] John's response: It's not about me; it's about Jesus.
 - b. John understands who Jesus is, which shapes his goals & priorities about life.
 - c. Application: Do you elevate yourself & take glory away from God? Or do you point people to Jesus, like John?
 - d. His identity shapes our identity because there is joyful humility in knowing that He is a worthy Savior.
- 2. [3:16b-20] Jesus' ministry is greater than John's: In baptism & judgment
- 3. [3:16b] Jesus' baptism is greater than John's
 - a. John baptizes externally with water; Jesus baptizes internally with the purifying fire of the Holy Spirit.
 - b. The Holy Spirit is the 3rd person of the Trinity God who makes us a Christian:
 - i. He regenerates us to be born again [John 3:5-8]
 - ii. He gives conviction of sin [John 16:8]
 - iii. He gives love for Jesus [1 Cor 12:3]
 - iv. He seals us for salvation & guarantees our inheritance with God [Eph 1:13-14]
 - v. He gifts us for ministry [1 Cor 12:4-11]
 - vi. He sanctifies & matures us [John 16:12; Rom 8:1-11]
 - vii. He empowers us [Luke 24:49; Acts 1:8]
 - c. To be a Christian is to receive the gift of the indwelling presence & power of the Holy Spirit.
- 4. [3:17-20] Jesus' judgment is greater than John's.
 - a. [17] Wheat: Those who belong to & abide in Christ, and receive His Spirit.
 - b. Chaff: Those who choose not to love & follow Jesus, blown away by temptation, religion, false teaching, etc.
 - c. Application: What's your identity? Are you wheat or chaff?
 - d. [18] Wheat response: Hear the good news, & humbly repent, demonstrated in baptism.
 - e. [19-20] Chaff response: Called to repent, but fight God instead (like Herod).
 - f. John doesn't judge people in a hypocritical way, but he judges sin an honest way.
 - g. John says his judgment is small compared to the great judgment of the coming Messiah, so repent.

Jesus is God [Luke 3:21-22]

- Why does Jesus get baptized?
 - a. Baptism is for sinners, but Jesus doesn't sin [cf. Heb 4:15; 2 Cor 5:21; 1 Pet 1:18-19].
 - b. Several possible reasons:
 - i. A symbolic anointing as the King of kings / Messiah.
 - ii. An endorsement of John's ministry as the forerunner to the Messiah.
 - iii. To set a precedent for how Christians should be baptized.
 - iv. Most significantly: To identify with sinners & show them how He will save them.
 - c. Baptism represents His death, burial & resurrection [cf. Rom 6:3-4].

- 2. Significance of Jesus' baptism:
 - a. The whole Trinity is present, validating Jesus' ministry.
 - b. Heresy of Modalism / Sabellianism: He's one God wearing 3 different masks at 3 different times.
 - i. Proven untrue: One God in 3 persons (co-equal, co-eternal, reigning as one), simultaneously present.
 - c. Jesus' baptism answers the question: Who is the coming One we are waiting for, greater even than John?
 - i. The Holy Spirit is publicly visible so that everyone would know & see Jesus is God, Savior, Messiah.
 - ii. The Father speaks from heaven & confirms: This is His Son.
- 3. Significance of the Father's proclamation: An issue of identity.
 - a. In ancient cultures, "Son of God" means the same as God.
 - i. The same glory, honor, authority, preeminence, power.
 - b. Jesus' Father is well pleased with Him before He does any public ministry.
 - c. Like Jesus, our relationship with God begins with love & approval (vs. religion trying to earn God's approval)

In Christ, you are a beloved son of God

- 4. Jesus went to the cross and took our place, giving us His place, so now we are sons of God [cf. Gal 4:6-7].
 - a. In Christ, we hold the esteemed, privileged position that the Son did.
 - b. We receive the full inheritance (beginning with the Holy Spirit) & family name, as Christians.
- 5. Application: In Christ, you have a new identity as a son of God.
- 6. <u>Application</u>: If you're not in Christ yet, you need to repent of sin, trust in Jesus, receive His Spirit, & enjoy being adopted as a son of God.
